Your letter and the note inclosed with Mr. Irwin's letter were both received. I was much interested to read about the school work, and to know you are getting on so well.

Whenever you get instructions from either Mr. Jaffray or Mr. Irwin relative to the support of native students, please let me know. My former teacher intends to go to School next fall D. V. Already I have his photo, and I was planning to send it to my uncle asking him to see if he could get some one to support him. I am keeping \$2.00 per month from his salary which will cover his incidental expences. We will need only enough to pay his board at the school and his fare to and from Lorraine. Since he is preaching, the Mission may pay his way to school. That is something we shall have to find out. My uncle attends a Baptist Church where he teaches a class of ladies. One of them gave money for a student last year and we awarded it to Mr. Ap. This year the class sent \$50.00 and since I knew you had enough for the present, Mrs. Jackson and I sent it to Miss Frost to support the two Bibb-women. As my uncle said, the money came from outside Alliance sources and he felt we were free to use it for students. This work appeals to his class of ladies, and they give for that when they would not to the general fund at N.Y.C. We are not diverting money that would otherwise go to the Treasury.

By your note of Nov. 19th. I see that the magazine is not to be published at present. Will they continue to print the S.S. lessons?
